The biggest challenge of 2022

On 24 February 2022, Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine was added to the list of already existing conflicts in the EECCA region. This event affected the network from many different angles. It became obvious that the plans we had made for the year were not up to date anymore, we had lost some funding and had to work for several months in rapid decision-making mode, without long-term planning.

We kept in touch with network members in Ukraine to understand what support they needed.

The network's board met regularly to assess the situation and make decisions about our activities.

We strengthened our communication internationally, launched two new social networks and started to write more in English.

At the same time, we kept in touch with our donors and partners in order to respond to the needs of civil society organisations in the region.

During 2022 CAN EECCA openly opposed the Russian invasion of Ukraine and raised the need for sanctions, an embargo on fossil fuels from Russia, and assistance to activists and NGOs through our international network.

The military theme has never been one of our working topics, so we focus on our area of expertise - developing a strong civil society to achieve climate neutrality in the EECCA region. Obviously, this can only be achieved in a peaceful environment.

CAN EECCA Network will continue to support the civil society in the region in every way possible to ensure their effective influence on climate policy.

CAN EECCA's organizational development

1.1 CAN EECCA's Vision

<u>Our Vision</u>: Strong civil society of the Eastern Europe, Caucasus, and Central Asia countries contributed to preventing climate crisis through achieving climate neutrality, fossil fuels phase out, equitable use of natural resources, and green economy opportunities development.

Our Mission: To support, reinforce, and develop civil society organizations in EECCA region in their capacity for influencing development and implementation of climate policy leading to climate neutral and more just future.

Our strategic priorities for 2021-2023:

- 1. Support of the ambitious and equitable climate policy development in EECCA countries, including through coordination at UNFCCC negotiations.
- 2. Mobilization of civil society and strengthening their influence on climate policy on different levels, including local communities.
- 3. Sharing experience among various stakeholders, creating platforms for collaboration and dissemination of knowledge on climate crisis.
- 4. Cooperation with mass media, development and support of communication channels in climate mitigation field.

1.2 Our structure

Coordination of CAN EECCA (Climate Action Network Eastern Europe, Caucasus and Central Asia hereinafter referred to as CAN EECCA) takes place through the work of the Board and the Secretariat. The main decision-making body is the General Assembly of members.

1.3 Regular meetings of CAN EECCA members

During 2022, network members met regularly online to exchange news and plans. These calls helped keep the communication and trust between network members from different countries intact, as well as share plans and opportunities from the CAN network.



Alas, due to the full-scale war and the great uncertainty in the plans, we were not able to get the network members together for a live meeting. However, a large number of network members were able to see each other during the COP27 conference, as we describe in more details in the section "Participation of EECCA civil society in COP27".

1.5 Participation in CAN Node coordinators meeting

In 2022, for the second year in a row, CAN International's annual strategy meeting took place online. Network members attended it in order to understand where and how the global CAN network is heading. As the global network strives to ensure that work priorities are chosen in the "bottom up" rather than "top down" approach, the participation of local organisations in such meetings is very important.



In June, regional and national CAN coordinators were able to meet live. Synchronisation at this level is necessary for the global network to keep moving in the same direction and to understand the context in which it operates.



Support and development of network members

2.2 Climate Dialogues













In 2022, despite everything, we decided to continue our Climate Dialogues project, but we simplified it considerably. Instead of the working groups that we had planned to continue supporting during the year, we organised three discussions.

Themes of our webinars:

- The impact of the Russia-Ukraine war on energy policy in the EECCA region
- Heating solutions beyond fossil fuels. Energy independence
- Climate change and gender justice



Through these online meetings we have been able to reactivate the climate dialogue expert community and re-launch public debate on climate and energy issues.

2.3 Small grants for the network members

In 2022, for the first time in a long time, CAN EECCA was able to accumulate resources to directly support network members. Five mini-grants of 2,000 EUR each were received by:



1. The environmental and cultural NGO Khazer, Armenia with the project "Laying the foundation for cross-border cooperation between communities in Armenia and Georgia on climate change", which aimed to increase the capacity of local communities in the border areas and create a sustainable mechanism for the implementation of climate change mitigation projects in the border communities of Armenia and Georgia;

2. Public association "Angel", Kazakhstan with the project "We are all responsible for the planet's climate", which aims to strengthen the capacity of environmental initiatives, members of CAN EECCA network, to promote climate policy at national and local levels by informing their local audiences about the climate negotiations at COP-27 and voicing the network's common position (producing short video clips, interviews with network members and country delegations from the event);

3. "Unison Group", Kyrgyzstan with the project "Preparing a National Position on Climate Change on behalf of Civil Society and Youth at COY17, COP27" involved a series of consultations with youth and public/private sector representatives and preparation of the Kyrgyz Public Position for COP27 on climate change;

4. Environmental organisation "Little Earth", Tajikistan. With the project

"Review of Climate Education in Secondary Schools" aimed at an overall assessment of climate change education in the secondary school curriculum.



Khmelnitsky Energy Cluster, Ukraine, with the project "Climate Leadership School". The aim was to create communities of environmentally conscious young people to solve local problems. The participants submitted their ideas for implementation and as a result, the winning initiative was a solar bench, which was handassembled by the students of the technical school.

2.4 Webinars and experience exchange

In 2022 we held 3 online events:

In October 2022, the network secretariat met in Bishkek, Kyrgyzstan. As 3 new people from Kyrgyzstan joined the team during the year, it was important to work together and to get to know the local members of the network better.



In November, the network's secretariat helped organise a training session for Central Asian journalists on climate change and climate policy. The main organisers were German organisation N-Ost, with network coordinator Olha Boiko and media coordinator Baktygul Chynybaeva acting speakers.

2.5 Communication acheivements

In 2022 we really strengthened our communications capacity:

- Our audience reach has almost quadrupled from 2021 reaching 1.97 million users in 2022
- We have managed to update our website and improve its English version. We invite you to check it out at www.caneecca.org
- We launched an <u>Instagram</u> page and relaunched our <u>Twitter</u> account in English
- We have continued to produce our weekly news digest, adding the English version for everyone to enjoy. You can subscribe by following this link
- You can now see much more video footage of our team members, as well as members of the network talking about the highlights of our digest and other news on Instagram
- Overall, our public communication now includes much more bilingual material.
 We have also started publishing materials in other languages of the region with subtitles.

Influencing climate policy in the EECCA region

3.1 Kyrgyzstan joining the CVF

For several years, we at Climate Action Network, together with our network members, have been trying to invite the most vulnerable countries in our region to join the CVF. At the COP26 Conference of Parties in Glasgow, together with our network members, Biom, we organised a meeting of the Kyrgyz delegation with the CVF secretariat.

We are pleased that Kyrgyzstan became the first country in the Eastern Europe, Caucasus and Central Asia (EECCA) region to join the CVF (Climate Vulnerable Forum). The CVF is a platform that brings together the most climate-vulnerable countries that produce the least amount of emissions. Together, they join together in advocacy at international negotiations, strengthen each other's position and set an example of ambitious climate policy.

3.2 Participation of EECCA civil society in COP27

This year, the civil society in the EECCA region was represented by members of the network from 8 countries: Armenia, Belarus, Georgia, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Russia, Tajikistan and Ukraine. We were able to meet with the delegations of the five countries, pass on our positions to them and establish links for further cooperation.



CAN EECCA members synchronised daily at regional and international CAN network meetings, which helped them not to get lost in the multitude of negotiation processes.

The network's media coordinator, Baktygul Chynybaeva, gave a presentation at the Ukraine pavilion on the power of small renewable energy sources in times of public crisis.



During the COP27 Conference of the Parties, the CAN EECCA Network Secretariat shared the Network's <u>common position</u> with country delegates and international partners. We also <u>compiled</u> all the positions from the civil society of different countries that our network members prepared in one publication.

During the first and second week, we closely followed the speeches of EECCA leaders and shared the reactions of our members:

- Vulnerability, military emissions and promises of decarbonisation. Speeches by EECCA leaders at COP27 (link)
- COP27: Azerbaijan Gas, Kyrgyzstan Calls for Climate Justice, and Uzbekistan's Proposal for a Climate Council (link)

Our social media expert Nargiza Korgoldoeva regularly reported from the scene and recorded interviews with our network members, which you can see on the CAN EECCA Instagram page.
